Before meeting was formally called to order, Steve Turnipseed made an announcement to those gathered that they can place pre-orders for pine straw from Georgette Gerry, at the back of the room. He answered questions about the different types of pine straw.

Our Special Presentation for April - **Rare and Endangered Wildflowers of Florida: A look at some of the rarest and most vulnerable wildflowers in the sunshine state**, by Author / Photographer, Roger Hammer a returning speaker from South Florida.

Roger L. Hammer is an award-winning professional naturalist, author, botanist and photographer who offers entertaining and informative programs to orchid societies, garden clubs, butterfly organizations, Audubon societies, environmental groups, botanical gardens, and civic organizations. Also on his resume is, survivalist instructor for the Discovery Channel's reality TV program, "Naked and Afraid".

A few facts presented about plants in the state of Florida:

Federal Endangered: 50 species

State Endangered: 445 species

Federal Threatened: 11 species

State Threatened: 117 species

Major threats: Habitat loss, displacement by invasive exotic plants, imported pests / diseases, fire suppression.

The presenter covered 74 plants from across the state and told a few interesting stories on what he had to do to get some of the photos. Of the plants covered: at least 2 are known to excellent landscape plants in Central Florida. The False Rosemary (*Conradina grandiflora*) and the Skyblue Clustervine (*Jacquemontia pentanthos*). Roger Hammer addressed questions from the audience until 2:50.

Donated plants were awarded to members and guest in the chance drawing.

The meeting adjourned at 3:00pm.
